

EXTRA INVESTMENT PLAN

Efforts to keep our streets clean and other key Council services are set to get a boost as part of the Blackburn with Darwen Council's budget proposals for 2022/23.

The extra investment of £1.5m will pay for improvements in environmental services and highways. This includes more staff to support litter picking, bin emptying, maintaining green spaces and parks. Road markings will also be repainted and signs replaced this year to improve safety and help deter anti-social behaviour.

Another priority is to fund free access to leisure activities this year to give a boost to residents' health and wellbeing. Libraries will also be opening their doors for longer.

Other plans included in the budget include working with communities to support climate change goals in the borough and support for vulnerable children.

Now in its final stages, the borough's new Local Plan sets out how development and growth requirements across the borough up until 2037 will be met.

2022 BUDGET **EXPLAINED**



It includes the £250 million transformation of Blackburn Town Centre, including the former Thwaites site and proposed relocation of Morrisons, and the £90m Darwen Town Deal investment plans.

There are also proposals for a new Household Waste Recycling Centre for the borough which would significantly upgrade the borough's existing facilities.


Council Tax makes up 39% of the Council's income to help fund services.

The Council relies on Government funding, local business rates and other income including grants, fees and charges to make up the remainder of its budget.

Since 2010 the Council has had to make cuts of over £140m, over 40% of its overall budget. In its funding settlement for Councils, the Government continues to assume that all Councils will increase their Council Tax by the maximum. The general increase proposed in Blackburn with Darwen is 1.99% plus 2% which is to be used solely for social care services.

CHRISTMAS REALLY DID COME EARLY FOR DARWEN THIS YEAR.

On December 17th, the Government officially signed off on £25m of funding for the town.

It was the full amount available as part of the Town Deal scheme – a real coup for the Darwen Town Deal Board.

Further boosted by funding committed by Blackburn with Darwen Council and private investors, it'll kick-start a £90m transformation of the town - the most significant investment in the area in living history.

True to the wording on the Darwen coat of arms 'Abque Labore Nihil' – 'nothing without labour,' securing the funding was just the start.

Now, business cases are being drawn up for each of the projects included within the successful bid.

Work is well underway on developing the proposals, which are set to be submitted to Government this summer - more details will be shared with residents and businesses in the coming months.

The Board were absolutely determined to secure as much of the £25m as possible. Chair Wayne Wild told The Shuttle.

We've said from the very beginning that this was a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for the town and it does feel like we're at the start of something really exciting.

Our bid was all about focusing on what can help make a real difference for the future of Darwen and for its residents and we're really looking forward to building on that throughout the duration of this five-year project.

THE FIVE KEY THEMES:



Town centre - including plans to refurbish and repurpose heritage buildings, such as the Market Hall and Darwen Library Theatre

Employment growth and business innovation - a range of important projects that will build on Darwen's proud and still strong manufacturing heritage - creating new jobs and opportunity



Destination Darwen - proposals to create new and improved connections linking the town centre, residential neighbourhoods, parks and the sprawling moors, including new trails

Connected Darwen – ultrafast broadband for more than 10,000 homes and businesses as well as free Wi-Fi in the town centre



East Lancashire Sports Village – new sporting facilities at AFC Darwen, J4 Skatepark and Darwen Cricket Club

Meanwhile, work is continuing on the Darwen Town Deal 'fast-track' projects including the state-of-the-art facilities at **AFC Darwen and Junction** 4 Skatepark – providing training facilities for our Olympic stars of the future.

The full restoration of Darwen's Jubilee Tower also will be completed ready to be enjoyed in the warmer months.

2021 was an incredibly busy year for AJ Odudu. The Blackburn born television presenter co-hosted a special edition of The Big Breakfast with comedian Mo Gilligan, she and good friend Emma Willis embarked on supporting small businesses in their pandemic recovery on Emma & AJ Get To Work, and, of course, she made it to the Strictly Come Dancing final – until an ankle injury forced her out of the competition.

And throughout it all, AJ always found time to declare her love for her hometown.

"Blackburn is where I got my grit and determination from," says the 33 year old, who grew up in the Montague Street area.

"I love the whole ethics of the place. It's a town filled with hard working people. I feel like people in Blackburn just work hard, get on with it and graft and I think that's something I take with me wherever I go."

AJ certainly has worked hard to get to where she wants to be. The young St Bede's High School pupil who had dreams of working in television wasn't really sure how to make it happen.

"It did feel like an impossible thing, says AJ. "When I was growing up all the opportunities were in London - we didn't have the BBC and ITV studios in Salford then. And back then, it was hard to get to Manchester, let alone London!"

Now a regular on our TV screens, AJ is known for her broad Blackburn accent – and we wouldn't have her any other way! But has how she sounds ever held her back?

"In my early career, being a Northerner seemed to hinder my career to be honest. The industry wasn't really a place that accepted black women who sounded like me!," A] remembers.

"I was advised that I'd get more opportunities if I went to elocution lessons and acting classes. I remember speaking about that with my mum who's lived in this country a long time and she still sounds like she's Nigerian – because that's how she sounds! If someone's accent doesn't change naturally, it shouldn't be forced to change and that's something that my mum's always really championed.

"I'm so glad that I kept true to myself and my roots, because now I feel like it is something that is celebrated.

"So early on in my career my Blackburn accent was something that could have held me back, but I pushed through! Now it's part of my individuality."

AJ feels it's easier now for young people from the North West to take opportunities to have careers in television. So what advice would she offer to young people in Blackburn who'd like to work in the industry?

"Just keep at it. Know that your individuality is what makes you special. It doesn't matter where anyone's from, what they sound like, how much money they have, you can achieve whatever it is that you want to achieve.

"Use the grit and determination that you get from your surroundings - that's something that I do think is ingrained in us northerners, I really do."

AJ visits her family in Blackburn whenever her busy work schedule allows. The town will always hold a special place in her heart.

"One of my fondest memories growing up is going to Corporation Park as a little girl. I loved it and it seemed so huge. We'd walk to the park from Montague Street, and then walk up the path – it felt like it took forever to get to the playground and the conservatory at the top."

AJ has backed our bid for city status for Blackburn. She said, "I'd love Blackburn to get city status. I remember the last time when we missed out to Preston – and I don't want that to happen again! I love Blackburn with all my heart. Good luck to us!"



You may have seen by now that Blackburn put its name in the hat to be awarded City Status as part of a national competition for the Queen's Jubilee.

At the time of publishing your Shuttle magazine, we were awaiting news of Blackburn's City Bid. The Council submitted Blackburn's bid to Government in December last year. The monarch decides which town should be granted city status on ministerial advice.

Regardless of the outcome, we think it's a pretty special place.

But, hey, please don't just take our word for it. You can see for yourself just what over 100 public figures, residents volunteers, businesses and religious leaders have to say about Blackburn and what makes it a city of our own makina.



GLOBAL BRAND BRINGING BUZZ TO DARVEN

AS PART OF THE NATIONAL FESTIVAL OF MAKING LAST OCTOBER, ITALIAN SPORTSWEAR BRAND C.P. COMPANY DREW INTERNATIONAL CROWDS TO POCKET-ROCKET DARWEN TO LAUNCH THEIR EXCLUSIVE ARCHIVE EXHIBITION.

CINQUANTA was an archival celebration of 50 years of the infamous brand, showcasing styles throughout the ages.

Celebrities including DJ Goldie, British magician Dynamo, Happy Monday's Bez and Shaun Ryder were amongst those visiting Darwen to catch a glimpse of the clothes up close.

While Darwen might initially have seemed like a strange choice for the Italian brand to host their exhibition, our heritage as the origin of professional football means we've always had a close link to sport-style - and Darreners have been donning C.P. since its beginnings five decades ago.

Funds were also raised at the exhibition for local homeless charity Nightsafe, which does amazing work across our whole borough.

The exhibition came alongside numerous other exciting events in Darwen, including the unveiling of England and Manchester United star Luke Shaw's giant mural, Britain's



biggest free to attend music festival Darwen Live, and the announcement of an incredible £25million worth of Government funding unlocked as part of the Darwen Town Deal.

Councillor Phil Riley Executive Member for Growth and Development, and the Council's lead representative on the Town Deal Board, added:"What we have seen happen in Darwen of late has been nothing short of world-class.

ST JOHN'S CHURCH IS SET TO RISE FROM THE ASHES AS THE FIRST PROJECT IN AN AMBITIOUS £250M MASTERPLAN FOR **BLACKBURN'S TOWN CENTRE.**

The church – the oldest in the town – suffered extensive fire damage in 2019.

Now, it's set for a £3.5 million refurbishment – transforming it into a high quality, flexible work space capable of meeting new agile working demands on the back of the pandemic.

Significantly, it'll be the first project as part of the £250m masterplan which also includes the former Thwaites site and the potential relocation of Morrisons.

Award-winning OMI Architects

has been appointed to lead the St John's scheme.

The firm's work includes complex heritage projects, similar to the church, involving some of the region's most important Grade I and Grade II listed buildings.

Notably, their All Souls project in Bolton was named RICS North West Building of the Year in 2015.

Councillor Riley added:

"The masterplan shows that the Council is forward-thinking with its place making agenda and I'm really pleased that we're already embarking on the first phase.

"It's incredibly important that our towns are fit for the future supporting our local economy, and creating higher quality jobs and living spaces to help build strong communities.


"We have faced significant challenges as a result of the pandemic but are doing everything we can to put our borough in a strong position for the future."

THE MASTERPLAN WILL BE PART OF THE BOROUGH'S NEW LOCAL PLAN WHICH PROVIDES A BLUEPRINT FOR FUTURE DEVELOPMENT.

The vision for the town centre includes:

- providing purpose-built business and technology workspace for low carbon, green and renewable industries as part of a new town centre business district;
- the repurposing and refurbishment of St John's Church to create high quality flexible workspace to meet new agile working trends post-pandemic;
- potential to relocate Morrisons to a new store located on the former Thwaites brewery site with the opportunity to retain and upgrade the existing car park for public use;
- providing low carbon town centre living in close proximity to services, retail, workspace and major public transport connections;
- implementing 5G town centre roll-out creating a 'super-connected town centre';
- refurbishing and re-opening the Fleece Inn to reflect the history of the locality; and
- improving public open spaces and increasing cycle and pedestrian routes with new connectivity to our local canal infrastructure.

SHARE YOUR VIEWS: HOW SHOULD WE MARK THE PANDEMIC IN BLACKBURN WITH DARWEN?

TWO YEARS ON FROM THE START OF THE CORONAVIRUS PANDEMIC, THE COUNCIL IS FORMING PLANS FOR A PERMANENT MEMORIAL TO THIS DEFINING PERIOD IN OUR SOCIAL HISTORY.

Council Leader - Councillor Mohammed Khan CBE commented, "There's no denying that the pandemic has changed our world. Our experiences over the last two years have inevitably shaped who we are now, both as individuals and as a local community.

"We want to create a lasting legacy in Blackburn with Darwen that recognises the impact of Covid locally, nationally and globally."

For a long time, Blackburn with Darwen was the hardest hit borough in the whole of England, in terms of the high number of Covid cases and the length of time we lived under tighter restrictions than other areas.

Our borough has a wealth of frontline workers who put their own lives on the line to keep essential services running when the country first went into lockdown.

Many local families were personally affected, losing loved ones during a very difficult time.

Our children and young people have had their education impacted, as well as their social activities, and many people had to deal with feelings of isolation.

Denise Park, Council Chief Executive, said, "Not everyone's *experience of the pandemic was the* same, so any memorial we create should reflect that.

"Tragically, for some people, the pandemic has taken loved ones early. For others, particularly those who work in the NHS and other frontline roles, it's been about working under extreme pressure and developing resilience.

"The pandemic also inspired many people to volunteer, to support people who were struggling and to show kindness to others. And of course, one huge positive is the NHS's largest ever vaccination programme that has helped people to start to get back to normal."

As part of the project to plan a lasting Covid memorial, the Council is gathering local people's

views through a short survey. We want to know what elements of the pandemic you feel should be commemorated, what sort of features you think would make suitable memorials, and the best locations for them, to make sure the project reflects our diverse communities.

Early thinking is that there won't be just one monument in one location, but a series of linked elements exploring a range of themes – possibly an interactive Covid memorial trail.

"We want to create a series of memorials that genuinely reflect our residents' experiences of the Covid pandemic – and that's why we're asking local people of all ages for their views," Denise added.

TURNING A NEW LEAF ON CLIMATE CHANGE

Great oaks grow from small acorns...

That's exactly the plan for thousands of saplings which are being planted right across our borough.

And it's not just oaks either, children and volunteers are busy planting Willows, Wild Cherry, Silver Birch, Crab Apple, Rowans and more.

The project is part of the **Council's Climate Change** Action Plan which will ramp up this year as the authority bids to be carbon neutral by 2030.

One of the key priorities is to store carbon naturally by increasing tree cover, protecting soils and enhancing natural habitats.

"We know there's huge benefits of planting trees," Councillor Zainab Rawat, the Council's Assistant Executive Member for Growth and Development tells The Shuttle.

"Not only do they provide a welcome boost to our green spaces and wildlife, they prevent flooding and help to combat climate change too by absorbing carbon dioxide, removing and storing carbon while releasing oxygen back into the air."

Councillor Rawat is proudly championing the Council's climate change agenda passionate about making a real difference here in Blackburn with Darwen.

"We know there's a huge amount of work to do to achieve our ambitions of being carbon neutral by 2030," she adds.

"We also know that we can't do it alone and we really need residents and businesses to play their part too."

And they are already doing so with residents volunteering to help plant 7,000 trees across Blackburn with Darwen in less than eight weeks.

"They're donning their gardening gloves, picking up their spades and answering our call for volunteers in their droves," Councillor Rawat says.

"It's fantastic to see people young and old come together to plant the saplings.

"They're enjoying the fresh air, they're meeting new people and they're all playing their own part in our fight against climate change thank you to them all!"

More than a dozen small woodlands are set to be planted as part of the Forestry **Commission's Local Authority Treescapes Fund.**

Blackburn with Darwen Council teamed up with local authorities from across Pennine Lancashire and the **Ribble Rivers Trust to secure** the funding with an extra 4,000 trees to be planted at schools across the county too.

One of the first to take part was Avondale Primary School.

"I love the idea that the children will be able to watch the trees they planted grow," Councillor Rawat adds.

"They'll be able to enjoy them while they're still at school, but also for decades to come that's just fantastic."

THE BRONZE LADY HAVE YOU SEEN THE INCREDIBLE STATUE **OF BARONESS BARBARA CASTLE?**

We unveiled a bronze Barbara in October 2021, created by sculptor Sam Holland.

The former MP for Blackburn takes pride of place striding purposefully across Jubilee Square with the Equal Pay Act in hand – a location she would have often passed on her constituency business.

Hosted by BBC Radio Lancashire presenter Sharon Hartley, the unveiling was attended by figures and residents who wanted to celebrate Barbara's inspiring work.

Barbara Castle, who served as Blackburn MP from 1945-1979, was instrumental in the Equal Pay Act and championing women's rights. She also introduced the Carer's Allowance, as well as road safety legislation that led to the introduction of seatbelts and breathalyser tests.

The statue was unveiled by the Rt Hon Jack Straw and Shadow Chancellor Angela Rayner, who both gave impassioned speeches on the influence and legacy of Barbara Castle, alongside Kate Hollern MP and Leader of Blackburn with Darwen Council, Councilor Mohammed Khan CBE.

During the speeches, members of Blackburn Youth Zone and One Voice also lead a special performance walk around Blackburn Town Centre, featuring placards highlighting the achievements of Barbara.

Councillor Maureen Bateson said:

"Barbara Castle was a trailblazer for women everywhere. She also represents all that's best about Blackburn, real grit and determination, succeeding often against the odds.

"We have such a rich history in both Blackburn and Darwen and yet we don't often hear about the role women like Barbara Castle played.

"The statue helps us honour all that she did and will ensure that her memory lives on – inspiring future generations.

"We hope it will draw visitors to the town and also address the distinct lack of statues of inspirational women in the county and right across the country while celebrating the area's rich heritage."

"I will miss being a councillor but I will continue to help people in whatever capacity I can. The memories will remain with me for the rest of mv life."


A distinguished local figure and councillor with 30 years' service has announced his decision to exit public life later this year.

Blackburn with Darwen Council Leader, Councillor Mohammed Khan - twice honoured by the Queen and awarded a CBE last year - will be standing down as Leader and retiring as a councillor when his term of office finishes in May 2022.

A Blackburn councillor since 1992, Mohammed was Mayor in 2008-09 and has been leader since 2015. Born and raised in Rawalpindi, Pakistan, he came to Blackburn in June 1965 where he worked and studied Textile Technology at Blackburn College.

After time spent in the USA studying Business Management at Pennsylvania State University and LA Salle Extension University Chicago, he returned to Blackburn in 1981, working in the textile industry before opening his own business in 1985.

Mohammed is one of a small number of senior British Asian local politicians and is widely recognised for his ability to bring communities together. He has been instrumental in influencing and shaping key national agendas, while keeping Blackburn and its people at the heart of everything he does.

WORK SET TO START AT BLAKEY MOOR

The sound of laughter filling the night sky, friends gathered around a table outside enjoying food, drinks and each other's company before heading across the road to watch the latest headline act at a packed venue.

With work now underway on transforming an integral part of Blackburn's 'cultural guarter,' this is what residents can look forward to in 2023.

For the last 100 years, Blakey Moor Terrace has stood opposite the grand King George's Hall – and for many decades before that too.

Dating back to the 1800s, and with a variety of uses over the years, the building had sadly started to show its age in recent years, lying largely empty and slowly falling into serious disrepair.

But now, as part of the council's £3m Townscape Heritage project with the National Lottery Heritage Fund, work has started that will see new life breathed into this crucial piece of the jigsaw.

Blackburn-based Forrest Joinery and Construction Contracts Ltd are leading on the impressive renovations designed by award-winning architects, Group Ginger.

It'll see the building split into two - ideal locations for new eateries in the town one with an impressive mezzanine floor.

To the rear, there'll be a brand new courtyard too that'll make the most of its south-facing position and link to the popular new Reel Cinema.

And, with new occupiers soon to be announced for the former Baroque bar and East Z East busy serving up its quality Indian cuisine, the whole area is already seeing a revival.

"We're all really excited to see this building brought back to its best," Councillor Phil Riley – the Council's Executive Member for Growth and Development tells the Shuttle.

"You only have to stand at King George's Hall and look down towards the new cinema and the Barbara Castle statue and already the area is looking really impressive.

"The work to Blakey Moor Terrace will add to that even further – providing a perfect location for new restaurants right in the heart of the cultural quarter in Blackburn."

The plans for the Terrace building delicately balance the need for modern facilities to secure its long-term future with a focus on preserving historical quality - refurbishing features where possible.

"It'll be no easy task and we expect the refurbishment to take at least a year," Councillor Riley adds, "but we know it'll absolutely be worth the effort.

"As we start to recover from the pandemic, we know that

a strong cultural offer will be more important than ever before and so this project is even more important.

"We want to ensure successful futures for our town centres and with the work here at Northgate and the £250m masterplan for the former Thwaites site, we're in a really good position to do something fantastic for Blackburn."

As part of the Townscape Heritage project, up to 16 historic buildings in the Northgate Conservation area will also be restored, with work already completed on five.

The 'Outside Side By

Side' project, delivered by Lancashire Wildlife Trust, aims to encourage people to get to know each other whilst discovering the benefits of being outside in the borough's beautiful green spaces.

Andy Mather from the Lancashire Wildlife Trust leads the groups. He said: "It's been great to connect new people, introduce new green spaces on their doorstep and see new friendships being forged.

"We've welcomed men that have lived in Blackburn all their life, refugees who have settled in Blackburn after having to flee their home country, and those dealing with anxiety and depression.

"Despite all our differences, we are just a bunch of blokes going for a walk."

Among the participants who regularly meet up for walks is Issa, 41, from Blackburn – a refugee from Myanmar.

Issa, who moved to Blackburn eight years ago, said: "Walking has been a good way of meeting new people who live nearby and hearing more about the area from people who have lived here all their lives.

"I've discovered local parks and green spaces that I hadn't been to before, and talking with the group has helped to improve my English."

56 year old Paul from Darwen said he had been humbled by hearing refugees' heartwrenching stories and learning about different cultures.

"It's been interesting to hear the difficulties people have faced and understand why refugees

have come to live in Blackburn. It's been a very valuable experience and I'm also learning new things about the place I've lived in all my life."

Nigel, aged 60, from Darwen added:

"It's been very humbling meeting refugees and hearing what they have faced. If I can play a small part in making Blackburn a more welcoming place, then I'm proud to do so."

'Outside Side By Side' is just one community project funded through the Council's 'Our Community, Our Future' social integration programme.

Apple Trees in Blackburn, which is run by Blackburn with Darwen Council, was judged to be outstanding by Ofsted inspectors in all areas – the sixth year in a row.

It is recognised as being one of the best services of its type in the country.

It provides short breaks for up to five children with complex needs at a time, up to the age of 18. The team provide a range of 'home from home' support and activity depending on the needs of the child, young person and carer.

Recent investment in the centre has supported the creation of a self-contained suite to further improve the service on offer.

During the inspection, parents

described the setting as a 'life saver'- providing children with care and support when they need it most. The report states:

"The children's home provides highly effective services that consistently exceed the standards of 'good'. The actions of the children's home contribute to significantly improved outcomes and positive experiences for children and young people who need help, protection and care.

"Children have enriching and life-enhancing experiences when they access this shortbreak service. They thrive and benefit from the exceptional care and opportunities that are offered by dedicated staff.

"Staff offer care that is highly sensitive to children's individual, and often complex, needs. Relationships that develop between staff and children are sustained over many years." Apple Trees allows young people to have social experiences outside of their immediate families in a purpose-built environment.

Councillor Julie Gunn, Executive Member for Children, Young People and Education, said:

"I am so proud that we provide this superb service which is making a huge different to children and families. The inspection judgement is a real testament to the hard work and dedication of the caring and highly-skilled team."

"This service really is one of the best of its kind in the country. We are able to help children and young people who have additional needs have opportunities to learn and grow whilst their families have time to re-charge."

Councillor Hardman is expected to be succeeded as Mayor in May by his deputy, Councillor Suleman Khonat.



A social media photography competition which ran alongside the tour attracted over 660 entries from across the county, and 107 knives were surrendered.

Councillor Mohammed Khan CBE, Leader of Blackburn with Darwen Council, said: "I feel incredibly proud that Blackburn was able to host the Knife Angel for the whole of Lancashire. It became a real talking point for anyone passing by and I hope that it helped to trigger some meaningful discussions around the dangers of carrying weapons."

HOMELESS PODS HELP KEEP VULNERABLE PEOPLE SAFE



Potentially life-saving provision has been delivered this winter – thanks to a scheme aimed at rough sleepers.

Following on from last year's pilot scheme, the 10 'homeless pods' on the grounds of the former Shadworth Leisure Centre have offered the most vulnerable people in the borough somewhere safe and warm to stay – as well as a range of wrap-around support services.

One of the residents to benefit from the initiative is Colin, 58, who was made redundant from his driving job. After struggling with his mental health and a break down in his relationship, he was made homeless.

Colin was referred to the mental health team who put him in touch with Blackburn with Darwen Council's Emergency Housing Team. Later the same day, Colin was offered one of the pods.

"I didn't realise there was this kind of help out there," said Colin, who has now been offered accommodation with support from the Council's Housing Needs Team.



The pods, which will be in situ until April, were trialled last year to deliver against the Government's Severe Weather Emergency Protocol (SWEP) which aims to prevent deaths of people sleeping rough during winter.

So far this year, the pods have accommodated 14 residents. Six have successfully moved

on to new accommodation or rehabilitation.

Last year, 14 residents went on to secure permanent accommodation with support services in place to help them adiust.

Councillor Mustafa Desai, **Executive Member for Adults** and Health, said: "We have had several nights of sub-zero temperatures, so the pods offer potentially life-saving provision for those sleeping rough."

Another resident to benefit is a 39-year-old woman who had been sleeping rough in Blackburn for two years and begging to feed her drug habit.

She said: "The pods were a turning point for me. I have been clean for 12 months now. Being offered one of the pods made me determined to change my life and turn it around."

Neil Otley, Housing Needs Team Leader within Adult Services and Prevention at Blackburn with Darwen Council, is looking at possibly extending the scheme beyond April.

He said: "There is no 'one scheme fits all' approach. We have to look at what provision is best for each individual we support."

She was emotionally drained so we relaxed and watched films in silent companionship and ate good food.

"One of her biggest issues was her sexuality, and that caused an increase in tensions at home. We discussed it at length and I told her often that she owed nobody an explanation it was her life. She was almost 17 yet had not been allowed to cut her hair.

I made an appointment and she had a dramatic asymmetric bob which really suited her. It gave her lots of confidence too."

BLACKBURN'S MULTI-MILLION POUND ALBION MILL CARE FACILITY NOW OPEN

A new development at Albion Mill is the first of its kind in the country, offering independent living, a community atmosphere and opportunities to lead a fuller life.

The Intermediate Care service provides wrap- around care helping residents become more independent through therapyled rehabilitation services, with staff and carers working together with residents to help aid their recovery.

This service at Albion Mill is a ground-breaking partnership arrangement between Blackburn with Darwen Borough Council, the Local Primary Care GP Federation and Lancashire Care NHS Foundation Trust.

The Extra Care scheme at the care facility provides modern apartments for BwD residents aged over 18 that require access to support to stay well whilst living independently.

36 people are currently settling into their new apartments and are enjoying their new independence, and the opportunity to take part in activities. The Extra Care scheme is managed in partnership with Inclusion Housing as the landlord, Willowbrook Homecare as the onsite care provider, and the Council.

Executive Member for Adults and Health, Councillor Mustafa Desai said:

"These services will provide vital support to residents across the borough".

The Concierge Service staff are there to welcome residents, families or visitors with open arms to Albion Mill and is the first point of call for residents to ensure they are kept safe and secure.

Residents can also get involved in the Mill's Community Hub which provides a wide variety of activities including; coffee mornings, dance classes, quizzes and bingo.

St Silas Church in Blackburn shared the impact it has had on their Sunday services, saying:


"Being able to live stream services helped to create an inclusive bond between those who are in church and those at home, helping to break down the feelings of loneliness."


